Reciprocal visit

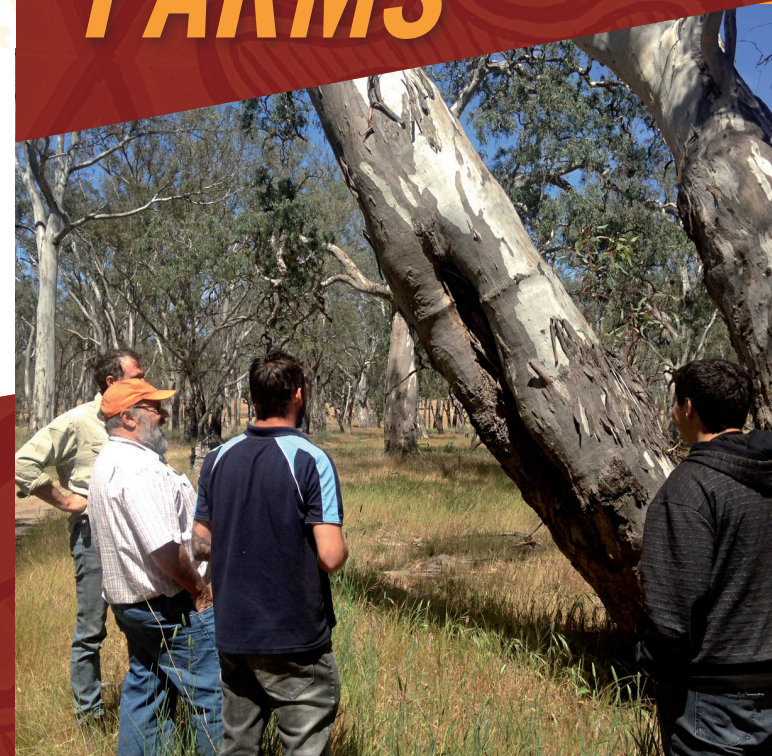
A reciprocal tour of Gunditjmara owned and managed properties on the Budj Bim landscape is a highlight of the program for many participants.

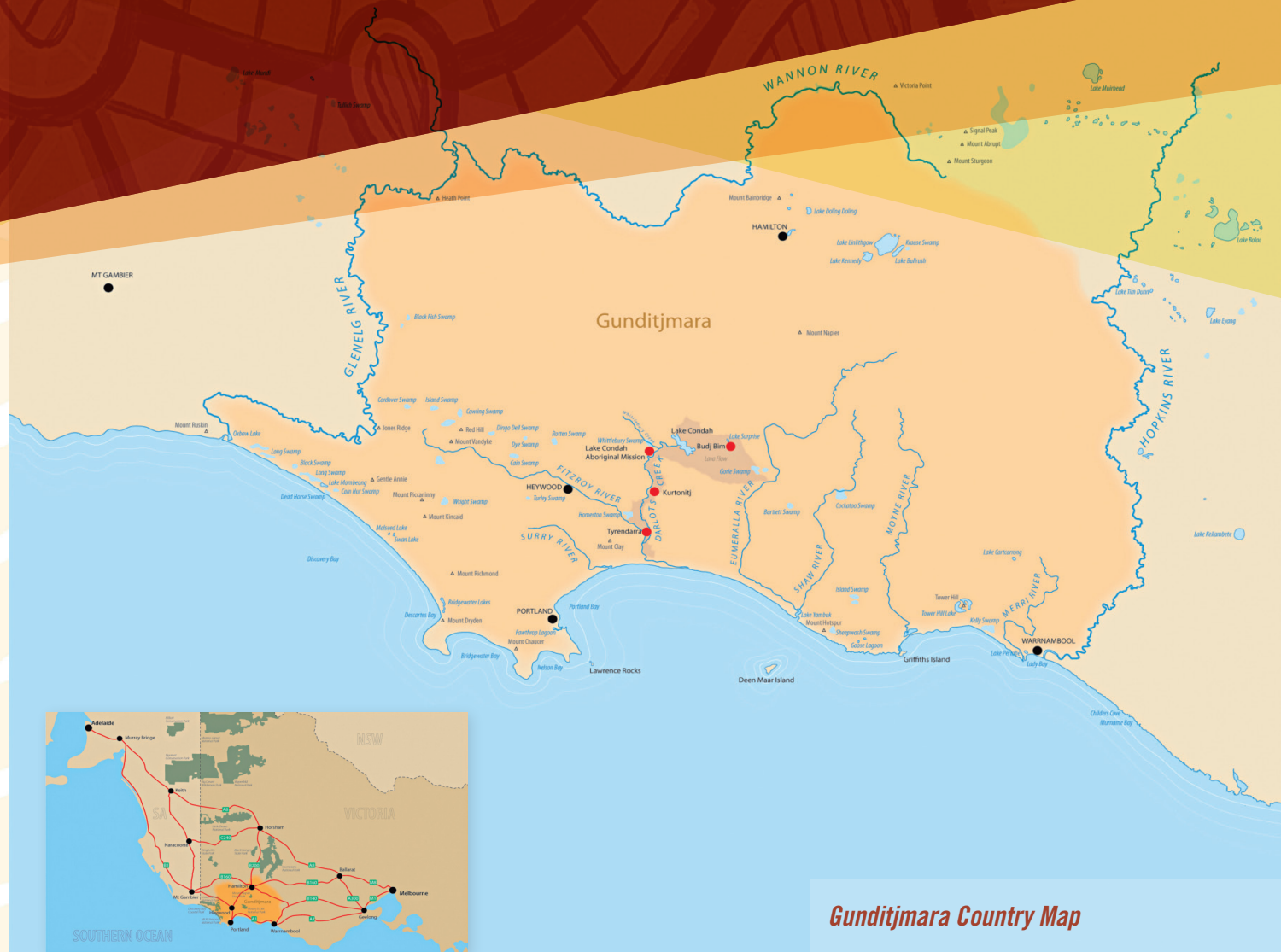
